



Groups of math facts that use the same numbers are called fact families. Who can help make a fact family using 2, 4, and 6?



"We can!" the frogs croak.




4 small frogs are dancing. 2 big frogs join in. That makes 6 frogs in all.



4 + 2 = 6. That's one fact in the family.




2 big frogs are singing. 4 small frogs join in. That makes 6 frogs in all.



2 + 4 = 6. That's another fact in the family.



6 frogs are hopping. 2 frogs hop into the water. That leaves 4 frogs hopping.




6 - 2 = 4. That's one more fact in the family.



6 frogs are resting. 4 frogs go to sleep. That leaves 2 frogs resting.



6 - 4 = 2. That's the last fact in the family.



These are the math family facts:
$$4 + 2 = 6$$
, $2 + 4 = 6$, $6 - 2 = 4$, and $6 - 4 = 2$.
