
Power Words give children the power to read! They include common words such as *the, to,* and *said* as well as words specific to the book.

Pattern Words that include the **sound /ō/**, spelled with the letters o and "magic e" (nose, bone).

Pattern Words have a common group of letters that make the same sound. For example, *-at* is the pattern in *cat, hat,* and *mat.*

Tips for Reading Together


- Encourage children to read independently, giving support as needed.
- Remind children to read each word instead of saying the words from memory. Pointing to each word can help.
- Work on sounding out some of the words. For example, /d/ /o/ /g/ = dog!
- As you read, ask questions to help children understand the story.
- Review the words at the end of the book. Can you find them in the pages of the story?
- Read again! It's helpful to read books many times.




Dad and I like dinosaurs.

to see a new set of dinosaur bones.




The workers were putting the bones together. They put the bones on a big pole with bars.




Each bone had to be put in place.

The big bones were lifted with ropes.




"Look at the skull," said Dad.

- "Look at those teeth!" I said.




There were so many bones.

It would take days to put them together.




"It's getting late," said Dad. "We have to go."


