Getting Ready

• Hide the Power Word cards around the room. If you're outside or in a space with printed words, look for power words on signs, labels, or posters to read out loud.

How to Play

- 1. Say a power word, and challenge each child to search for it.
- 2. Encourage the child to say the power word out loud when they find a word.

What You'll Need

- 1 Number Cube

- Pencil

How to Play

- 1. Have each child roll the number cube, and match the number rolled to the corresponding power word on the sheet.
- 2. Each child reads the word out loud, and writes it on the paper.
- 3. Repeat the process until all squares are filled with power words.
