Practice letter Uu. Help your child learn the concept of opposites.

Language Concepts

To help your child learn about opposites, choose an object in the room and describe it. Ask your child to hunt for an opposite. For example, say, "This pillow is soft. Can you find something hard?" Continue with other examples. You might try these opposites: short/tall, white/black, on/off, open/closed, soft/ hard, small/large, smooth/bumpy.

What Is Missing?

Ask your child to identify the ending sound that you have removed from a word. For example, you might say, "Listen carefully. Treat, tree. I took away a sound when I said tree. What sound is missing from the end of tree? Treat, tree." (Emphasize the ending sound in the first word to help your child hear it.)

Remember that both words may not be real words. For example, you might say, "Dog, daw. What sound is missing at the end of daw?" Also, the words may be spelled differently. But remember, you are asking your child to listen for the missing sound. Try the following examples:

wide, why	might, my	late, lay
date, day	rake, ray	job, jaw
Mike, my	whale, way	sheet, she
goat, go	treat, tree	

Explain to your child that being able to hear the sounds in words will prepare them for learning to read!

*/ŭ/ is the first sound in *under* and *up*.



If your child already knows the meanings of these words, reviewing them will help with comprehension of *The Bus* and can help your child begin to recognize these words when they see them in print.

bus: something like a car with seats for many people

people: men, women, and children

town: a place that is smaller than a city

up: not down
