

# Sorting

Practice sorting. These activities will help your child spot similarities and differences between objects.

### **Grocery Store**

When in the grocery store, notice how the aisles are organized. Which items go in which aisles?

## Sort Objects at Home

Make opportunities to sort objects at home:

- · Sort grocery items in order of size.
- · Sort laundry by color, type, or owner.

## Organize

Help your child organize their belongings. Sort by similar attributes. Group books by size, stuffed animals by color, and toys by type—cars, dolls, blocks, etc.
