

The Three Little Pigs

Use these simple activities to have fun reading together!

Discuss the Pigs

Ask your child to name the characters in the story. Turn to page 6. Ask your child to describe the first little pig. If your child does not mention the saxophone in the picture, be sure to point it out. Ask your child what the saxophone tells you about the pig. Then, turn to page 9. Ask your child to describe the second pig. Be sure to point out the fishing pole and talk about it. Finally, turn to page 12 and ask your child to describe the third pig. Be sure to point out the pig's book and what that tells you about the pig. Ask your child what item they would bring if they were a fourth pig.



Reread page 15 to your child. Using the words and pictures, talk to your child about the wolf. Why is the wolf knocking on the pig's door? Why does the wolf use a friendly voice? Why does the author say the wolf is big and bad? Then, reread pages 24–26. Talk to your child about how the wolf has changed. What lesson does your child think the wolf has learned?

Talk About Overcoming Tough Situations

Review some difficult situations the pigs overcame in the story. First, they were kicked out of their house by their mom. Second, they had to figure out how to build a house. Finally, the first two pigs had to run from the wolf. The pigs did not give up when they had a tough problem. They worked to find a way to solve the problem. Talk about a time when your child had to work hard to get through a tough situation.
